

MAIDSTONE HEALTH COMPLEX FACT SHEET

Includes the renovated Maidstone Hospital plus an expansion to integrate long-term care services (replacing Pine Island Lodge) and community health services in one building.

Size: approximately 50,000 square feet

37 Beds

26 continuing care beds (24 long-term care, plus 2 respite beds)

11 acute care beds (5 general acute, plus 6 specialty rooms)

Specialty Rooms (can also be used for general use):

- a palliative care room with adjoining room for family members
- a bariatric room for heavy patients requiring specialized transfer equipment
- an isolation room with infection control features
- an observation room for short stay, close patient monitoring
- 2 swing rooms for residents awaiting placement in long-term care or acute care

Timeline

June 10, 2008 – Grand opening ceremony

February 2008 – Pine Island Lodge residents and staff move into new space

January 2008 – Fund-raising gala

December 2007 – Maidstone Community Health Services moves into new space; public tours

April 2007 – Acute Care Services moves into renovated space

March 2006 – Construction begins

October 14, 2005 – Sod turning ceremony

Fall 2003 to Spring 2005 – Project planning and consultation; fund-raising begins

September 18, 2003 – Government approval announced
